Administration/Finance

Bids for the new City Hall/PD reconstruction project will be opened on Friday, February 8th with construction awards to be done at the February 19th Council meeting.

The Special Election on February 5th went smoothly. Thanks goes out to staff and the election judges for pulling things together on such short notice.

The City has officially taken ownership of the Northwoods Arena. We look forward to working with CAHA on the long-term operations of this great community asset.

Human Resources

On February 25th Scott Elwood, Retirement Counselor, Minnesota State Retirement System will be at City Hall from 9:00 am - noon and 1:00 pm - 3:00 pm to answer any questions about existing or new deferred compensation accounts and to help you enroll if interested.

This City sponsored, self-driven retirement account is a deferred compensation account and provides you with a method to supplement retirement income from your Minnesota public pension and Social Security benefits. Contributions are automatically deducted from your paycheck that you can increase, decrease or stop your contribution amount at any time. Contributions can be made "pre-tax", meaning you won't pay federal or state income until you withdraw them from your account. This means you can lower the amount of current income taxes you pay each pay period. You do have the option to make after-tax contributions as well. We encourage you to stop in and see Scott on February 25th.

Finance

Auditors were on site last week to review 2018 financials. They will be back in May to wrap things up.

Public Works/Parks

It's been a busy week in Public Works. A string of electrical failures at Pump Station Two have necessitated some close coordination with the Mill and an emergency contract with a local electrical engineering firm for further testing.

The crews were busy Wednesday repairing two water leaks followed by two days of plowing. We would like to thank those of you who have reached out in recent weeks in appreciation of our plow drivers. It's only natural to tire of snow removal this time year but an occasional thank you goes a long way to making those 3:00 am start times a little less painful. Also, please see the attached news released regarding snowplow safety. It's a good reminder of precautions all motorists should take while traveling during snow removal activities.

Economic Development

This week staff participated in APEX's (Area Partnership for Economic Expansion -- northeast Minnesota & northwest Wisconsin) Talent Forecast Workshop with area businesses and communities. APEX hired research consultants to conduct 150 interviews with organizations of all sectors and individuals of all demographics and presented the key findings from the 2018 Talent Forecast visits, worked with attendees to find regional consensus on priorities, brainstormed approaches to addressing priorities and potential implementation strategies.

The Cloquet EDA met this week and received a status update on the Digital Marketing Project with Ady Advantage and discussed recommendations for Council EDA Commissioners to bring forward at the Council retreat for further discussion.

Staff and FDL met with the Arrowhead Arts Council to discuss and understand grant opportunities for the community. Staff and the Chamber met with ISD 94 to brainstorm student workforce development opportunities.

Planning & Zoning/Building Inspections

Staff was busy preparing for next week's Planning Commission meeting. Phil Demers is the newest member of the commission and will take his oath of office at this meeting.

Building/Housing Code

Building Official Matt Munter attended 3 days of continuing education at the Association of MN Building Officials Conference this week. Coursework for this session is approved by the Department of Labor and Industry and instructed by International Code Council representatives. Sessions included plumbing, wall assembly fire penetration, and commercial fire alarm and ventilation safety. Upon returning to the office he followed up on a few outstanding enforcement issues, conducted residential HVAC inspections, and commercial inspections for ALDI and White Pine Apartments.

Staff has been working closely with PermitWorks on permit data and transferring records from the old system (Municipal Manager) into the new PermitWorks system.

Library

The library will be hosting a webinar on Postive Youth Development in Talking about Teen Sexuality on Monday, February 11th at 8:00 a.m. for anyone working with youth.

Our adult, youth and children's Winter Reading Programs continue through March 2. We have been posting on our website, Facebook and in the library, our Leaders are Readers program. So far we've had Community Education Director, Ruth Reeves, Joel Soukkala, County Seat Theater Company General Manager, City Administrator Aaron Reeves, author Thomas Peacock, Ann Markusen, Pine Knot columnist, Michael Cary, Cloquet Public Schools, Superintendent, and Harley D. Huskies, the Duluth Huskies Mascot. Check out our website for upcoming leaders and the books that influenced their lives.

The Annual report that needs to be turned in to the State Library is under way. Interestingly, we have 5000 less items than last year and circulation is up 19%.

Dear Mill and Overlay Resident:

On Wednesday, February 27 at 5:30 PM an informal neighborhood meeting will be held to discuss the proposed improvements planned for your neighborhood. The areas highlighted on the attached map are proposed to be included in a maintenance project. The goals of the project are to replace deteriorating concrete curb and gutter, replace outdated pedestrian ramps and extend the pavement life by removing a portion of it and replacing it with a new driving surface. There is no special assessment to property owners for this work; the project is being funded as part of the city tax you already pay. All available residents and property owners wishing to discuss the project further are encouraged to attend.

The meeting will involve engineering staff being available to answer question and if necessary a short presentation. I am available by phone or email if anyone wishes to ask a questions before or after the meeting as well.



Enclosed is the monthly financial report and cash and investment analysis for December 2018.

Cash and Investments

Cash balances are 24% below December 2017, mostly due to the City Sales Tax Bond issued in May 2017 being spent on projects and the purchase of the MCCU building. A narrative and several spreadsheets discussing this month's cash and investment activities, and balances are attached.

Budgets

<u>Revenues/Transfers in</u> – Most revenues are in line with budget except rental inspector charges have not started since a rental inspector has not been hired to date.

<u>Expenditures/Expenses</u> – Selected department and fund expenditures/expenses are analyzed on the following worksheets.

Major Revenues and Expenditures/Expenses

Revenues:

State \$82,600 for City Sales Tax, \$1.24 million for LGA, and \$1.35 million for the PFA water treatment plant loan. Carlton County \$2.4 million for the City and CAFD property taxes.

Expenditures/Expenses:

Ulland Brothers \$114,500 for four-five year gravel crushing stockpile. MCCU \$1.785 million for the building purchase. TPG \$40,100 for waterline leak repair materials. Boldt Construction \$21,100 for the skatepark. Briggs \$13,100 legal fees for the PFA loan. Granicus \$18,400 for the new website. Northland Constructors \$34,800 for mill and overlays.

City of Cloquet Cash and Investments Management Summary December 31, 2018

Analysis of Portfolio

Attached is a "Cash and Investment Analysis" which shows the type of accounts and values that make up the City's cash and investment portfolio.

Current Economics

The economy is still on the slow but steady pace. The State's budget and economic outlook remains sound. The budget horizon shows slower growth. The current biennium is estimated to leave \$1.544 billion available for the FY 2020-21 budget based on the November economic forecast but the November and December general fund receipts are less than projected. Unemployment is at 3.9% for December.

The City's certified 2019 LGA is \$2,485,000 approximately \$7,000 more than 2018 and the City decreased its levy by 1.5% for 2019. The 2019 health insurance rates are 3.06% more than 2018.

Current Activity

During the month a municipal bond for \$150,000 matured in December. Proceeds are sitting in the money market which is earning almost as much as the average CD rate the City currently has. The money market accounts are accumulating a large amount of cash for the February 1st bond call and MCCU remodeling. The City also has large capital projects this summer/fall. Attached is an "Investment Portfolio Analysis" with the detail of investments.

Variance Analysis

Cash and investments are 24% below December 2017. The decrease is mostly due to the spending of the City Sales Tax Bond issued in May 2017 and the purchase of the MCCU building.

The federal benchmark interest rate was raised for the fourth time in 2018 during the December meeting to 2.25% to 2.50%. The Fed announced there is likely going to be two increases in 2019. Attached is an "Interest Earnings Analysis" which details the average balances invested, rate of return, and prior year rates.

The budgeted interest earnings are \$326,000 for 2018. The City's investment annualized yield is approximately \$182,000 or 1.85% plus another \$135,200 in money market interest for 2018. Interest receipts were \$309,000 for 2017.

MnDOT urges motorists to be cautious when driving near snowplows

ST. PAUL, Minn. – There have been more than 25 crashes so far this winter involving vehicles and state snowplows. With winter far from over, the Minnesota Department of Transportation is urging motorists to use extra caution during plowing and snow removal operations.

"The main causes of these crashes are motorists driving too fast for conditions, driving too close to the plow and driver inattention," said Todd Stevens, acting state maintenance engineer. "Our snowplow drivers are well-trained to operate their plows, which often travel much slower than the posted speeds because it is most effective for clearing roads. For safety's sake, motorists need to be patient and stay back from the plow."

Stevens said that operators have a restricted view from the plow cab, so they must rely on mirrors to see to the rear and side of the truck. Their vision is also hampered by the snow clouds they create while they plow.

"The safest place you can be is well behind the snowplow and away from the snow cloud it creates," he said. "The road is clear behind the plow but not necessarily in front of it, so in most cases it makes sense to travel behind the plow."

Last year in Minnesota, there were 84 crashes involving vehicles and MnDOT snowplows.

Minnesota law requires motorists to turn on their headlights when it's snowing or at any other time when weather conditions impair visibility.

Other recommendations for safe driving around snowplows include:

- Stay alert for snowplows, which turn or exit frequently and often with little warning. They also may travel over centerlines or partially in traffic to further improve road conditions.
- Stay back at least 10 car lengths behind the plow. Don't drive into a snow cloud.
- Slow down to a safe speed for current conditions.
- Turn on your headlights and wear your seat belt.
- Turn off the cruise control.
- Be patient and remember snowplows are working to improve road conditions for your trip.
- Don't drive distracted.
